

Contractor's Social Value Guide

About this Guide

This guide has been produced to help suppliers and contractors include Social Value in their tenders and quotes. The guide:

- defines Social Value as it applies to the Council.
- outlines the Council's Social Value objectives.
- explains how Social Value is scored in competitions.
- provides examples of possible Social Value requirements.

Background

Huntingdonshire District Council wants the best possible value for every pound spent. Beyond compliance with the specification and cost the Council seeks wider community benefits from its tenders.

Marks are available for Social Value in the scoring of tenders and therefore, Social Value answers can change the outcome of competitions. This brief guide sets out how contractors could contribute towards these outcomes.

Defining Social Value

Social Value is the additional economic, social and environmental benefits that can be created from Council procurement, above and beyond the value of the works or services. A set of examples is listed in the table below.

Social Value Objectives

These are typical Social Value objectives:

- Promote training and employment opportunities.
- Build the capacity and sustainability of the voluntary and community sector. Practical support for local voluntary and community groups.
- Promote environmental sustainability by reducing wastage, limit energy consumption and procuring materials from sustainable sources.
- Engage with local businesses to develop skills and build capacity.

How to Score Marks for Social Value?

To score marks for Social Value the measures offered **must** be:

- related to the subject of the contract, and
- delivered within the District.

For example: for a proposed construction contract creating a new job in HR in a corporate headquarters elsewhere in the country would fail on both counts. An apprentice working on the site would score.

Whilst volunteering and other activities are laudable as part of a Corporate Social Responsibility programme, they will not contribute to the scoring and evaluation of a tender unless they pass both of the 2 tests above.
